Do You Recognize Someone in This Photo?



Our President, Georgia Muhs, won a 1st Place Ribbon in the "Shepherds' Lead" class at the Sheep and Fiber Festival, September 7th, 2014. In this class contestants are judged on the articles of clothing they are wearing, which must be made of wool or alpaca fibers and ideally are made by the contestant. The contestant must also be leading a sheep of her own or a borrowed one. Georgia was leading Babette, her first born lamb of the season, a brown American Shetland. Babette was wearing a necklace made of a wool "I" cord with a felted wool flower knitted by Barbara Osmolski. Georgia also made most of the garments worn by the other contestants in this photo. *Congratulations Georgia (& Babette)!*

THIS MONTH'S PROJECT/TECHNIQUE(S):

This month we will be making Halloween themed items the first meeting, and a wine caddy/cooler (which can be felted) the next week. Our scheduled projects and patterns follow.

Oct. 17 we will be making Ghosts and Candy Corn, and both can be made using knit or crochet techniques.

For Ghosts you will need a size **G** crochet hook, or size **3** knitting needles. Try to find white Glow in the Dark yarn (and a few scraps of black for eyes and mouth accents). The pattern was written using Bernat yarn. Yarns for both ghosts are DK or Worsted weight.

For Candy Corn you will need number **5** double point needles for knitting; orange, white and yellow yarns, and some stuffing for your finished products. The knitted pattern can be found at <http://www.purlbee.com/2012/09/30/whits-knits-candy-corns/> The pattern is written for 10 candy corns and calls for a light fingering weight yarn, 70 yards of (canary) yellow, 56 yds of orange, 28 yds of white. The finished size = 5 ½ inches around the base and 3 ½ inches tall.

(I will also bring a few copies of the pattern I edited for my own printing).

Trudy will have copies of patterns for the crochet candy corn and both of the ghosts at the meeting.

Oct. 24 we will be making a Wine Caddy which can be felted when completed.

Knitted Felted Wine Caddy:

This wine caddy is knit in the round, with a knit in handle. The bag starts at the top edge, and is knit down toward the bottom.

You will need:

- 200 yards Worsted Weight wool yarn (Be sure to use non-washable WOOL yarn. Cotton or synthetic yarns will not felt)
- US size **10 ½** needles

Crocheted Felted Wine Caddy:

This wine caddy is worked in rounds of single crochet. This bag starts at the bottom edge and is crocheted in rounds toward the handles at the top.

You will need:

- 200 yards Worsted Weight wool yarn (Be sure to use non-washable WOOL yarn. Cotton or synthetic yarns will not felt)
- Size **F** or **G** crochet hook (English size 8 or 7)

Crocheted Wine Caddy patterns will be supplied at the meeting, and the knitted version will be attached to the Newsletter email for your own printing at home.

OUTREACH

There are undoubtedly many local non-profit organizations who are struggling during this difficult economy. If you know of any that would benefit from knitted and crocheted items made by our members, please let us know.

Hats for the Homeless: Homeless men in our surrounding area are always in need of warm hats. Trudy Grimm is taking donations for this project. Make a few from your scrap yarn and help those in need.

Warm Up America: This is an ongoing project. The goal of the nation-wide “Warm Up America” afghan project is to provide warm crocheted or knitted afghans to anyone in need. These afghans are distributed to various agencies. The Red Cross and Salvation Army distribute the afghans to victims of natural disasters, area homeless, and for families and those who have lost their homes and belongings due to fire, flood or tornadoes. Forty-nine blocks that measure 7” X 9” are joined together to complete an afghan. Use your scrap yarn to make some 7”x 9” knitted and crocheted blocks. Myra will continue to collect them throughout the year.
