SEPTEMBER MESSAGE FROM CO-PRESIDENT SUE

Crafting has always brought people together. Makers, those who appreciate their work, and families who support the maker's work. Crocheting, knitting, needlepoint, quilting, embroidery, sewing all can be done alone, or in a gathering place. Those gatherings are where family and community joys and burdens are shared and lightened. Or where work stresses are relieved. Or personal demons are chased and conquered.

I reflected upon these ideas, and the universality of crafts over the summer. While at my family's 60+ year old summer retreat, I spent some hours volunteering at our local, beautiful Audubon Wildlife Sanctuary. Working the front desk, I had a few quiet moments when I would pull out my knitting.

Oh, the conversations that knitting started. From pre-adolescents wondering "how I did that", and "who is that for", to adult visitors who wanted to share their own knitting adventures with me. Often, as I would lay my project down to take an admission fee or orient visitors to the trail system, the exchange would include a discussion of a favorite pattern designer, hand dyer, LYS or even (once) stitch markers. And it did not matter what language the visitors were speaking. (Have you tried explaining the perils of ticks and poison ivy to people from Turino?) Almost everyone had a favorite craft, or a favorite person who considering them "knit-worthy" enough to make things for them. My fellow volunteers were also part of the discussion. Some days, I felt that we might have discussed fiber more than the birds, weasels, otters and terrapins that are so much a part of this sanctuary.

All of this writing is to stress how what we do is always good for our own well-being. But, in a world that can sometimes seem determined to tear itself apart, we are often pulling it back together, one stitch at a time.

OUTREACH

If you know of any local non-profit organizations who would benefit from knitted and crocheted items made by our members, please let us know so we may include them here.

Warm Up America: An ongoing project, the goal of this nation-wide effort is to provide warm crocheted or knitted afghans to anyone in need. They are distributed by The Red Cross and Salvation Army to victims of natural disasters, area homeless, and to families and individuals who have lost their homes and belongings due to fire, flood or tornadoes. Forty-nine blocks that measure 7" X 9" are joined together to complete an afghan. Use your leftover and stash yarn to make some 7"x 9" knitted and/or crocheted blocks and bring them to a meeting. Myra will continue to collect them throughout the year.
